

The first show dogs I ever had anything to do with were Samoyeds from the Kobe kennel in the UK. Owned by Mrs Perry and her daughter Renee Ashfield they were at that time probably the best Samoyed kennel in the country. Mrs Perry's son was our then next door neighbour and I used to go with his daughter to help with "nanna's dogs".

After leaving school I worked in a boarding kennels which also had racing Greyhounds and then for a few years dogs didn't figure very prominently in my life. But soon after getting married I was back in the dog world with Cavaliers. I even brought some of these down when I came down here in the 1960's aboard the "Canberra" along with the then Govenor General Sir Bernard Fergusson's dogs.

I showed these for a few years in what was Molly Grocott's era. Again I had a period without dogs on my return to the UK and then went into Large Munsterlanders where we had a great deal of success both with our home bred dogs and one we imported from Germany who is still high up in the top ten of all time in the breed despite it being over twenty five years since he was last shown.

On returning down here we stayed in gundogs with an Irish Water Spaniel and then got into Clumber Spaniels which we have had now for quite a few years.

I have been very lucky with my judging career which took me back to Crufts in 2005 for a once in a lifetime experience. During this career I have been fortunate enough to judge at specialty shows both in the UK and Australia as well as New Zealand and judging at your show takes me all the way back to where I first entered the dog show world.

We have not yet decided who will be the judge. There is a cup for the winner but to be able to take the cup home the child needs to be a member of the Club. Also we require very young children to have an adult helper in the ring.

Perpetual Trophies (Cups)

Now would be a good time to get any cups you won last year engraved and any damage repaired. As far as I know all cups handed out last year were in good order. Lynda is our new trophy steward so please help her in this role by returning the cups in time for the show and discuss with her any repairs that need to be made. All the cups will be photographed this year before hand out as part of an audit of the Club's cups. To take home a cup that you have won you need to be a member of the Club.

Shared Lunch

There will be free tea and coffee and a shared lunch that we will have during the lunch break that will most likely coincide with the judging of Junior Handler.

Sponsorship



Quick Read - Jumping Up

Jumping Up

Dogs often jump up on people. This is normal behaviour for a young dog. Puppies of wild dogs and wolves do it all the time to teach them how to act as a predator or how to challenge other pack members. It may be cute for a puppy to do, but as your pup grows into a large dog you'll probably regret encouraging him when he was younger.

There are 3 easy ways to get your dog to stop jumping up. You can try which ever way you think your dog will respond to the best, or try all three. They don't have to be done in any particular order.

The Body Block

As the dog starts to jump up on you, turn your body sideways so that as their paws hit, they slide straight off again. Don't say anything and don't extend your hands to push the dog away, as this is only giving attention to the dog. When the dog has its feet back on the floor, ask it to sit, then reward with a treat.

Armed with Treats

The idea of going out into the backyard armed with treats is to distract the dog and give it an alternative behaviour to jumping up. But the trick is to be quick! As the dog is approaching you, say "sit", then hold a treat at arms' length, at the height of the dog's nose. (Do not hold the treat higher than the dog's head, or you are forcing the dog to jump up for the treat!) The dog should stop when it gets to the treat, then sit. Then you give the treat as a reward.

"Too Bad"/Time Out

This method involves isolating the dog when it does something wrong, by your leaving the scene. Step out into the back yard and let the dog jump on you, say "sit" and if the dog doesn't respond immediately, say something like "too bad". Then immediately turn and go back inside and leave the dog on its own in the yard. Wait out-of-sight for 10 seconds, then repeat. Each time you are forced to go back inside, stay there for a longer period of time – the second time stay for 30 seconds, then 60 seconds, then 90 seconds, etc. The dog will soon realise that if it doesn't sit like you ask it to, then you'll go away and it will be on its own again.

With any of these methods, please remember that your dog is excited to see you and it's only doing what is natural. So don't yell or punish your dog with pain and you'll find that he will trust you more and will learn faster.

Quick Read - Ticks

TICKS - DOGS AT RISK

Only one type of tick, the New Zealand Cattle Tick, occurs in New Zealand, and this tick can infect both dogs and cats. This makes us fortunate compared to most other countries in the world, where ticks can cause serious disease in pets. Keeping exotic ticks out of New Zealand is important for the health of our animals and people.

Ticks are arthropods, closely related to scorpions, spiders, and mites, and are ectoparasites that feed only on the blood of their hosts. Dogs and cats may be parasitized by hard ticks (ticks with a hard shell).

Hard ticks have four life stages: egg, larva, nymph, and adult. The last three of these attach to a host to feed on blood before dropping off and moulting to the next life stage. Developing stages like to find a dark, moist hiding place such as crevices, under leaves, or in the root mat of grasses and rushes, and when moulted to the next stage and ready to feed again, climb a grass or other high plant to wait for their next meal. Adult ticks can increase their weight by more than 100 – fold when engorged with blood, and after detachment lay thousands of eggs.

THE NEW ZEALAND CATTLE TICK

New Zealand's only tick, Haemaphysalis longicornis, is most common on the North Auckland peninsula and on the east coast of the North Island as far south as Hastings. On the west coast of the North Island it occurs as far south as Waikanae. It has been recorded in the central North Island around Taupo, National Park, and Taumarunui, and in the Golden Bay area of the South Island.

The most common host animals are sheep, cattle, goats, dogs, horses, deer, and hares, but other mammals, including man, and many species of birds may also be infested. Cattle ticks can be found anywhere on the host's body, but are most common on the ears and in the groin and axilla (armpit).

To feed, ticks insert their mouthparts through the skin of the host. These punctures, and any associated tissue reaction, reduce the value of hides and skins. On young animals tick infestations can cause severe blood loss.

Eggs are laid in late spring and early summer. In warm, moist areas with mild winters, such as northern Hawkes Bay, adults and nymphs can be found on animals at almost any time of the year except mid winter. In contrast, in temperate areas such as Horowhenua, animals only have ticks late spring, summer and early autumn.

This tick does not transmit any diseases in New Zealand as far as is known. This limits the significance of tick diseases in this country. Tick infestation is mainly a problem for young farm animals.

Pet animals in tick areas should be checked for ticks, especially dogs that have been for walks in long grass where livestock have been. Tick prevention collars and topspot applications are also important to repel ticks.

EXOTIC TICK DISEASES

In other countries, ticks can be associated with:

- Blood-loss anaemia in heavy infestations
- Damage to the skin tick mouth parts cut through the host's skin; bites are generally painless but local irritation and infection may occur.
- Tick paralysis tick saliva in some tick species contain neurotoxins (nerve toxins) that can cause life-threatening tick paralysis.
- Tick borne diseases ticks can transmit various bacterial, viral and protozoal diseases.

transmitted by our cattle tick

Babesia gibsoni is an example of an exotic disease that can be transmitted by our cattle tick. It is a microscopic parasite that infects red blood cells, causing a disease called babesiosis. The main sign is anaemia as the immune system destroys red blood cells, but Babesia can have other effects that are extremely serious in some pets. Disease is often controlled rather than ever cured. All dogs are blood tested before coming to New Zealand as part of our quarantine measures to protect the disease from entering this country.

New Zealand also wants to keep out exotic ticks. The Brown Dog Tick (Rhipicephalus sanguineus) is a serious pest of dogs. In large numbers they can cause anaemia, and they transmit many diseases including babesiosis, erlichiosis and rickettsial disease (these last two are serious bacterial diseases that are also exotic to New Zealand). By keeping the ticks out of New Zealand, we are also keeping these diseases out, as they can only be transmitted by a tick bite.

The Paralysis Tick (Ixodes holocyclus) is the single most dangerous parasite of dogs on the eastern coast of Australia. Just one tick is capable of causing paralysis and death. Dogs may become infected with ticks as they brush through long grass or scrub. The tick releases a toxin during feeding which causes a variety of clinical signs, and if left untreated many animals die.

Tick prevention for pets in certain areas of Australia is hence absolutely crucial. Pets should be checked for ticks regularly especially after being in grass and low bushes. Early removal is important as this gives less time for neurotoxins or diseases to be transmitted to the pet.

Modern tick prevention collars and topspots have hugely improved prevention and must be strictly applied.

Tick control for pets in areas of New Zealand is often done at the same time as flea control. We are extremely lucky in this country to be free from more serious exotic ticks and the diseases they transmit, and strict quarantine controls are in place to ensure that this does not change.

If you are taking your pets abroad, be careful to learn about the potential dangers from ticks and other parasites and disease, and do what you can to keep your pets safe and healthy.

Boarder protection for ticks

The first two of the photos below, are from a dog that recently arrived in New Zealand. Our preexport quarantine requirements are that dogs and cats are treated and inspected twice for ticks prior to entry. Ten days quarantine in New Zealand (except for Australia – pets are just inspected again at the airport on arrival) is then carried out.

On this dog an astounding 155 ticks were found at the check by vets here, which took them 1.5 hours to remove. The dog remained in quarantine for further treatment and checks, and had to undergo further blood tests to check it was not infected with Babesia.

Pile on the covers Winter's coming

Winter is just around the corner, so it's time to consider the comfort of everyone, including the family pooch.

An extra blanket or two for the bed, coats, scarves and hats hauled out of the closet, plus a stockpile of firewood at the ready – you may be well prepared for the cool weather, but is your dog?

Before winter well and truly hits, it's important to make sure your dog is in peak condition. If your pooch is carrying extra weight, don't kid yourself into thinking that it's ok because it will help keep him warm over winter. Too many extra kilos can cause health issues, so ensure you monitor his body condition and make a serious effort to keep him at his optimum weight all year round.

If you notice some weight starting to creep on, adjust the amount you're feeding him and encourage him to exercise. It's also a great idea to invest in a dog coat as he'll be more motivated to get outside if he's warm and dry. Make sure to find one that fits well and, if he's not used to wearing one, give him time to get used to it.

If your dog has a short coat or lean body weight, a dog jacket can also be used in the early morning and evening for some added warmth.

Bedtime is also a hugely important consideration over winter. If your dog sleeps inside, invest in a fleecy bed and blankets so that he's nice and cosy and doesn't resort to hopping onto your bed in the middle of the night because he's cold.

If he sleeps outside, however, show him how much you love him by investing in a warm kennel and waterproof bedding so that he's not exposed to the elements – he'll be much happier to hunker down if he knows he's not going to spend the night shivering in the cold.

Arthritis in dogs:

Older dogs tend to struggle more with arthritis during the cooler months than throughout the summer. If you notice your pooch is low to get out of bed, hesitates before jumping into the car and is generally less active from one winter to the next, have him checked over by your vet.

Treatment options for arthritis vary but if your dog is carrying more weight than he should be, a weight management plan is a good place to start. A joint support diet, like Eukanuba joint mobility, can really assist in making your dog more comfortable.

Swimming and hydrotherapy can also do wonders for an arthritic dog. Indoor facilities specifically tailored for dogs are dotted throughout New Zealand and are the ideal place to get your four-legged friend into the water and exercising throughout the cooler months.



Dog Walking 101



Hey you, new pooch parent—yeah, you with the cute puppy who can't stop pulling! Want some tricks to keep Trixie on task? Or perhaps you're already an old pro but want to make your outdoor excursions more fun for both you and your dog. Follow our insider tips and your pooch will be eager to get going as soon as you pick up the leash!

It's the Leash You Can Do

What's the best type of leash? "Use whatever you feel most comfortable holding," recommends the ASPCA Animal Behavior Center's Kristen Collins, CPDT.

Flexi-leads are best reserved for walks in the park, when it's safe for a dog to explore a bit further away from her pet parent. They are NOT a good idea if you're walking in an area with high foot traffic or off-leash dogs, as the long line may get wrapped around your dog, a person's leg or another dog. Many people think chain leashes look nice, but they are much heavier than nylon or leather, and they can be very hard on the hands. Even so, they sometimes



work well for dogs who like to tug or bite the leash. "Metal doesn't feel nearly as nice in a dog's mouth," explains Collins.

Leather leashes are a good option because they are easiest on the hands.

Nylon leashes can cut into hands or give a pet parent "leash burn" if a dog pulls a lot or unexpectedly lunges forward. But they come in many stylish colors and designs, and they hold up well after repeated exposure to rain and snow.

Pull Over, Rover!

Constant pulling on the leash makes walks stressful for both of you. "It's a common problem that can happen for a number of reasons," says Collins.

If your dog darts after local wildlife, it may help to walk him when critters are less likely to be out and about; avoid dawn and dusk. You can also check out our article Dogs Who Are Reactive on Leash. If the problem is simply pulling on leash due to natural canine enthusiasm for all the exciting signs and sounds you encounter on walks.

Try using a head halter to walk a dog who's excitable on leash. "They provide power steering for dog parents!" says Collins. "The Gentle Leader" by Premier" Pet Products is my personal favorite." Details and more can be found in our article Walking Equipment for Your Dog.

Stay Off the Grass (and Out of the Flower Beds!)

During the warmer months, it's important to keep your pet safe from toxic lawn and garden

products. Insecticides and certain types of mulch can cause problems for our furry friends—during neighborhood strolls, please be sure to keep your pooch off the lawns of others.

Even though popular spring bulb plants like tulips and daffodils add much to our landscape, they can cause significant stomach problems for our furry friends. If your pooch likes to stop and smell—or nibble—the flowers, please keep him on a short leash during your walks.

So Nice to Meet You!

It's great that your friendly pooch loves meeting people during walks—but not so great that she jumps up on them. "The basic idea is to teach your dog how to sit on cue and then require her to sit to interact with people," says Collins. "No sitting, no greeting. But if she sits, she gets to enjoy the reward of greeting her friends." It doesn't hurt to reward the dog with a treat—or ask the person whom she's greeting to offer a treat.

Three Things To Bring

If you're planning an extended walk, be sure to bring water for your dog—especially if it's warm outside. Don't forget the goodies! Walks are great training opportunities. Bring Fido's fave treats along, and practice tricks and obedience while you're out in the world. "This will solidify your dog's skills and convince him that going on walks is fantastic fun!" says Collins.

Don't get caught without extra poop bags, particularly if you're going on a long walk. (P.S. This is a great way to recycle all those plastic grocery bags!)

Watch for Creepy Crawlies

Depending on the time of the year and the area of the country you live in, sneaky critters like snakes, spiders, scorpions and bees can be a serious concern for pet and parent alike. If you're walking in a densely wooded area, take extra care to keep an eye out for hidden dangers.

To Be Free or Not to Be Free—That Is the Question

Taking a walk to a dog park or other fenced-in area that's safe for canines to romp freely? Make sure your dog is prepared for off-leash play. "Your dog must know how to come when called," says Collins, "so the most important thing to do is teach a really reliable recall."

Take It Up a Notch

Here are some suggestions for making walks more fun for your dog:

Mix it up! Try taking your dog to new places. He'll love experiencing the new sights, smells and sounds at a novel location.

Choose fabulous destinations. If possible, walk to fun places, like friends' houses or the dog park. Walk with buddies. If your dog likes other dogs, consider group walks. You can either borrow a friend's dog to accompany you, or invite family and friends who have dogs to meet you somewhere.

What's Bugging You?

Walking in humid, mosquito-friendly areas? Spray yourself, not your pooch! Even though it's tempting to share insect repellent with your pooch, it can be a grave mistake. Insect repellent should never be applied to dogs, who can suffer neurological problems from the toxic ingredient, DEET. Instead, ask your veterinarian for a suitable, pet-specific alternative.
